Happy 30th Anniversary to the Galesville Heritage Society (GHS)! Three decades of commitment, tenacity and passion by hundreds of Galesville volunteers have catalyzed a vibrant organization dedicated to preserving Galesville's past, engaging residents and visitors in the present and protecting our village uniqueness into the future.

From the foundational meeting in September

1991, a small group of dedicated local residents knew the importance of preserving the village's heritage and approached this ambitious goal with abandon. Their vision was simple but broad: to preserve the past to enlighten the future. In the years that followed, Galesville's objects and records of historical significance were collected and put

on display, first in

Roberta Cassard's (GHS founder) car trunk, then the West River Market and finally in the Carrie Weedon house on Main Street.

Today, the first class Galesville Heritage Museum showcases historical pictures, artifacts, and models reflecting nearly 370 years of Galesville history. Native American, businesses, donors, and Maryland and Anne Arundel County grantors are also appreciated for their innumerable contributions. Together, we are keeping Galesville's traditions and heritage alive in the present. On GHS's 30th anniversary, let's all wish for 30 more years of growth and success!
